


Diabetes in the U.S.



In 2019, 37.3 million Americans had diabetes.

- Undiagnosed: Of the 37.3 million adults with diabetes, 8.5 million were undiagnosed.
- New cases: 1.4 million Americans are diagnosed with diabetes every year.
- **Prediabetes**: In 2019, 96 million Americans age 18 and older had prediabetes.

Diabetes in Delaware



- Approximately **96,844 people** have diagnosed diabetes.
- About 24,000 people have diabetes but don't know it.
- More than 35% of the adult population has prediabetes.
- Every year more than 6,000 people are diagnosed with diabetes.

What is diabetes?





What is diabetes?

People develop diabetes when:

- The pancreas can't make insulin.
- The body can't use the insulin the pancreas produces.

What is insulin?

- A hormone made by the pancreas.
- Acts like a key to let glucose (sugar) from the food we eat pass from the blood stream into the cells in the body to produce energy.



Three main types of diabetes:

Type 1 diabetes

- Can develop at any age but occurs most frequently in children and adolescents.
- Your body produces very little or no insulin, which means that you need daily insulin injections to help manage your blood glucose (sugar) levels.
- Currently there is no known cause or cure for type 1 diabetes.

Type 2 diabetes

- More common in adults, and accounts for around 90% of all diabetes cases.
- Your body does not make good use of the insulin that it produces.
 - A large part of type 2 diabetes treatment includes increased physical activity and a healthy diet.
 - Your health care provider might also recommend medicine.





Gestational diabetes

- Consists of high blood glucose (sugar) during pregnancy and is associated with complications to both mother and child.
- Usually disappears after pregnancy, but mother and child are more likely to develop type 2 diabetes later in life.

Other causes of diabetes

- Conditions like cystic fibrosis and pancreatitis.
- Use of drugs for HIV/AIDS or after an organ transplant.



Prediabetes

- Blood glucose (sugar) is higher than normal but not high enough to be diagnosed as diabetes.
- If you have prediabetes, it doesn't mean you'll develop type 2 diabetes.
- Food choices and physical activity can delay or even prevent diabetes.

What is an A1c test?


- Blood test that checks your average blood glucose (sugar) level over the past 2-3 months.
- Used to diagnose prediabetes and diabetes.
- Used to see how well your diabetes treatment is working over time.
- A critical step in forming your care plan to manage your diabetes with your care team.




What do A1c numbers mean?

- No one-size-fits-all target range.
- Target levels vary by each person's age and other health factors.

The goal for most adults with diabetes is **less than 7%.**
